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Contacting delinquent members proves effective

Lodges should aim for a 5-6% delinquency rate each year. One of the most effective ways to help reach that goal is to engage with delinquent members. This can be done through emails, letters, and phone calls made by your lodge lapsation committee. In many instances members simply forgot to pay their dues and just need a reminder. In other cases you may discover that a member had a bad experience in the lodge that you had no idea about, Or you could find out the person is experiencing a hardship and in need of relief. But you won't know these things if you do not put forth the time and effort to contact delinquent lodge members. And this is proving an effective strategy not just in Oregon but in lodges across the country.

The historic Astoria Lodge No. 180

The Astoria lodge was chartered in 1890, sponsored by Portland Lodge #142. It is currently the second oldest chartered lodge in Oregon having been around for 133 years. The original lodge building was opened in 1910 and was in use until it burned down during the Great Astoria Fire of 1922. The fire started in the early hours of December 8th. The fire burned for over 11 hours and destroyed nearly the entire business



district with over 220 businesses burned down over nearly 30 city blocks. More than 2500 residents also lost their homes in the fire.

Following the fire, a new 3-story building was built on the site the old lodge. The building was designed by architect Charles T Diamond American in an Renaissance style. building The was constructed between 1923 and 1924 and



was dedicated in late 1924 and has served as the home the Astoria Elks Lodge since. Today the lodge is listed on the National Register of Historical Places.



The lodge is housed on the third floor of the building which also housed five apartment style rooms that back in the day were used for dignitaries when they made visits to the lodge. These

rooms still exist today but are mainly used for storage. In the 1950's the building underwent some changes with removal of a racket ball court and the addition of an elevator and



operational.

Recently the St Helen's Lodge held their lodge meeting at the historic Astoria Lodge and used it as an opportunity to help Astoria raise money to replace their aging boiler. This meeting was attended by 164 members from 13 lodges, including members from



bowling alley. The

bowling alley, located

in the basement, has

four lanes but is not

currently functioning.

The lodge hopes to be

able to revitalize it one

day and get it back to

three lodges in Washington. Oregon State Elks Association President Nick Bettencourt and Grand Trustee Joe Basil were also in attendance. The members present raised over \$5,000 for Astoria which was more than enough to replace their boiler.

The Elks have a saying that so long as there are veterans, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks will not forget them. Elks around Oregon spent the last month giving back to veterans who have served our country. Here are some reports on veterans activities from around the state:

Serving our Veterans Facilities



Residents and staff of the Oregon Veterans Home in The Dalles (OVHTD) were surprised with a BBQ style lunch cooked up and delivered by local Elk members on Sat., Oct. 21. More than 190

residents and staff dished up burgers, homemade potato salad and beans in the courtyard at the Home, and enjoyed time eating together.

Led by Elk veterans committee support leaders, PERs Dr. Robert Wymore and John Buckley from Hood River Lodge #1507, they joined forces with a handful of Elk members, the Home's food service staff and the Home's team to ensure as many residents as possible and staff received food and beverages outdoors and in the Veterans Home.

The Home's Activities Director Jade Lange said they always appreciate the generous support that the Elks provides their residents and others. "The Elks are an amazing group of people that continue to support the Veterans through donations year-round, special funding for needed items, and are always happy to help with whatever the Veterans might need or want, Lange said. "We are truly blessed to have the support of the Elks since the opening of the Veterans Home back in 1997."

Welcome Home Boxes

Emma Pletz and Ken Crawford of Milwaukie Portland #142 were recently honored at a gala by Do Good Multnomah, an organization supporting veterans on all levels, by presenting them the 2023 Challenge Coin. Emma has helped set up three brand new buildings for Do Good with Welcome Home

kits as well as putting together kits as a continuing support to veterans going into permanent housing. Ken is constantly



dropping off towels and bedding at the Do Good warehouse to help with their efforts to get veterans out of shelters and off the streets and into permanent housing.

Salem Lodge

The Beaverton Lodge hosted an evening celebrating our US Veterans. The Lodge welcomed veterans and guests to a delicious Prime Rib or Salmon Dinner. Veteran's enjoyed their meal for free thanks to a generous donation from the Sgt Mad Dog Wells Foundation. Our evening began with the colors presented by the Oregon Wing of the Civil Air Patrol. He served in Vietnam from 1964-1965. All in attendance were rapt in what he had to say. It was a very moving speech. After the ceremony dinner was served which included specially created patriotic cupcakes, provided by a local bakery, for dessert.

Seaside



Seaside Elks Lodge #1748 held a Veterans Celebration with the lodge officers, two Boy Scout Troops, a Cub Scout Troop, and the mayor of Seaside reading the city's Veterans Day Proclamation. Each Military Flag was presented and posted by the Scouts. Veterans in the audience stood and saluted as their flag was

placed. Their military branch song was played and sung by the audience. Each Veteran then individually approached the US Flag, saluted, spoke their name, service branch and rank. Each Veteran then lined up and was presented a "shot" of Pendleton Whiskey, Military Edition. All waited until each Veteran had a glass, then drank together. As the toast ended, the audience stood and clapped for them. A free spaghetti dinner was served after the program. Approximately 67 people attended the program. Everything from dental floss to coats are stocked and available. All items are brand new and donated by the Elks, as well as by a few other 'service' organizations. It is in a constant state of restocking, as there is plenty of need in our area. The Clothing & Food Donation Room is located in Building 2 and is open daily Monday thru Friday from 8 to 3 and manned by 2 of the sweetest Volunteer ladies you'll ever meet! The Donation Room serves over 2,000 Veterans a year.

Include local officials in your Lodge's charitable outings


December is a busy month for a Local Lodge's charitable events. When planning your events, always remember to invite your local elected officials.

Little-known facts, legends about the American flag

- The flag is normally flown from sunrise to sunset. If flown at night, it should have a light shining on it.
- The U.S. flag always flies at the top of a staff above any other flag.
- An American flag should never touch the floor or the ground.
- When displayed on a wall or window, the blue field should be in the upper left corner.
- The designer of the American flag was Francis Hopkinson, a signer of the Declaration of Independence as a delegate from New Jersey.
- The first time the flag was flown after being adopted was August 3, 1777.
- The United States flag has been changed 27 times. The final star for Hawaii was added in 1960.
- The design of the current 50-star flag is commonly credited to Robert G. Heft, a 17-year-old high school student.
- Fifty flags fly 24 hours a day around the Washington Monument
- Pennsylvania is the only state that observes Flag Day as a state holiday.
- Six American flags have flown on the moon, and five are standing. Neil Armstrong's fell over.
- 95% of U.S. flags are made in the United States.
- The military folds the flag with 13 folds, each with a symbolic meaning.
- The gold ball on top of a flagpole is called a "truck" in military terms and a "finial" in civilian terms. The ball keeps rainwater out and serves as ornamentation. Balls won't catch and tear the flag if it blows up over the pole.
- Military lore claims the gold balls contain razor blades, matches, and bullets, which can be used to prevent an enemy from capturing a flag during an attack.
- When your flag is old and has seen better days, retire it.
 Old flags should be burned or buried.
