Welcome Home Kits: Helping homeless veterans transition to stable housing

Every night as many as 40,000 veterans are living on the streets somewhere in our country. Each has a different story, but they all shared a common pledge to support and defend this country. Not that their service is done, it is our turn to help serve those who sacrificed for us. In partnership with the Department of Veterans Affairs the Elks National Veterans Service Commission has pledged to help end veteran homelessness, and ensure that every veteran has the safe, stable home they deserve.

Two lodges that have very active Welcome Home Programs are the Milwaukie-Portland Lodge and the Salem Lodge. Salem has been using an Elks National Foundation Impact Grant for the last 3 years to work with Easter Seals Supportive Services for Veterans Families to provide welcome home boxes to veterans they are assisting into stable housing. Salem has distributed over 300 boxes over the last 4 years in the Salem Community. In addition to ENF funds, members donate to help support the welcome home project in cash as well is in helping buy items for the boxes. The team working on the project at Salem also shops deals and sales so they can make sure to stretch their funds as far as possible. Using



sales, coupons, and rewards the lodge recently purchased over \$2,000 in supplies for their welcome home boxes and after savings only spent \$565.

Before COVID, the lodge held a fundraising dinner for their welcome home program. Their partners at Easter Seals brought several veterans who had benefitted from the project with them. One veteran stood up and talked about how for the first time in his children's lives he was able to cook and serve them dinner at his own place because of the welcome home kit our lodge provided that included pots and pans, dishes, silverware, and glassware. And this is just one of the hundreds of impact stories whose lives have impacted by this program.



Recently Milwaukie Portland Lodge helped Larry, a pre-Vietnam era Air Force veteran, get settled into his new apartment with a Welcome Home kit. The kit included household items such as dishes, glasses, silverware. cookware. cooking and prep utensils, food storage containers, bedding, bathroom items, laundry and cleaning

supplies. Other than a mattress on the floor and a TV sitting on the floor, he had nothing else yet to help him get settled in. Working with Easter Seals and Home Care Heroes, Larry will be getting food and furniture soon to have a complete apartment that he can be comfortable in. Our veterans are so appreciative of the kits that the Elks supply, many of them going into housing with only the few clothes they have. Milwaukie Portland has partnered with Do Good Multnomah, as well as Easter Seals, in setting up over 100 veterans with Welcome Home kits, including setting up two brand new facilities. This is a great program set up through Elks Veterans Services where the lodge will be reimbursed up to \$300 per kit, or \$500 if the kit includes a bed. If your lodge isn't helping our veterans yet, reach out to agencies in your area that support veterans and see if you can help them out!

Home Kits. Generally, this kit would include some small furniture, kitchenware, and cleaning supplies. Items can be new or used, donated or purchased.

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The ENVSC will reimburse up to \$300 per kit and up to \$500 for each kit that includes a bed (dependent on corresponding receipts).

Whether your Lodge wants to provide a few kits a year or a few kits a week, we've got you covered.

Here are a program guidelines to keep in mind.

- A kit must include a variety of items. It may not include just one of two items.
- Kits are intended exclusively for veterans exiting homelessness and moving into new homes.
- Gift cards may not comprise more than \$25 of any kit.
 Food may not comprise more than \$25 of any kit.
- We recommend that beds do not comprise more than \$400 of any kit.

Ready to get started?

- Find a partner to connect your Lodge with veterans in need. Speak with the facility and the veteran about their needs.
- Get the community involved! Consider holding a supply drive to collect commonly needed items.
- Deliver the kits to the veteran or your project! Many Lodges take photos with the veterans when they deliver the kits. (Check out our Instagram page for examples!)
- Complete the form and upload your receipts online. You
 may include multiple kits on one form. We'll send you a
 reimbursement check, in accordance with the receipts
 provided.
- Stay in contact with the veterans! Having an Elk as an advocate and friend can further help these veterans to thrive in their new home. Consider the Adopt-a-Veteran program.

Recent news reports show dangers of drugs and firearms

Drugs and firearms seem to be going hand-in-hand these days, as these news reports from October can attest.

- In Rutland, Vermont, a 31-year-old man and a 34-year-old man were arrested and charged by criminal complaint. Both men were charged with possessing with the intent to distribute cocaine, cocaine base, and fentanyl, and for carrying and using firearms during and in relation to a drug trafficking crime.
- In Rockland, Illinois, a 28-year-old man was sentenced to an aggregate 10 years in prison for possession with intent to distribute cocaine base ("crack") and tetrahydrocannabinol ("THC"); possession of a firearm as a felon; and possession of a firearm in furtherance of drug trafficking crime. The sentence consists of concurrent 60-month terms of imprisonment for the drug trafficking and possession of a firearm as a felon convictions, to be followed by a consecutive 60 months for possession of a firearm in furtherance of drug trafficking crime conviction.
- And in New Hampshire, a 36-year-old man was sentenced to 72 months in federal prison for possession with intent to distribute controlled substances, conspiracy to distribute controlled substances, and carrying a firearm in furtherance of drug trafficking.

The list goes on. It is proof that drugs and violence are related.

Despite this disturbing trend, there is good news as we enter the Christmas season. Evidence suggests that the Elks Drug Awareness Program's efforts are having a positive effect on young people and that drug abuse among our targeted population is trending downwards. This is no time to rest or think that our work is over. Far from it! Our children need us now more than ever.

Perception: How others see our order and your lodge



No matter what we may think, the community's perception of our order and our lodges is our reality. The community and prospective members will see what they want to see. Our job is to let them see who we really are through our actions and how we present ourselves.

To start, what message does the appearance of our lodge send to the community? Do you have clear and readable signage? Is your exterior clean and presentable? If your facility looks rundown and unclean from the outside people will not want to find out what it is like inside. You facilitate should reflect who the Elks are and what we do in our communities. And it is not just the exterior of your facilities that you should make sure reflects a positive image of who we are. The inside of your facilities should also be clean and welcoming to members and guests. If a prospective member comes in and sees a dimly lit and dirty facility would that entice them to join?

In addition to your facilities how guests are treated in your lodge and club is also important to setting a positive perception of the Elks and of your lodge. If guests come in and members are rude to them will that make them want to join? Guests and prospective members should be wELKomed into our lodges and talked with about who we are and what we do. If our members are seen as snobs or just a bunch of cliques it will make it hard to convince people to join us.

And it is not just the perception of those outside our order that we need to worry about. Our own members often have perceptions of our lodges that can be less than flattering. And when a member has a negative perception of the lodge, they are less likely to stay members or help bring their friends and neighbors in as members.

So keep in mind the importance of perception and how it defines us in the eyes of our communities, prospective members, and our current members. Make sure that visitors and prospective members can see what we do. Post notices of fundraisers, events, pictures from events, and thank you cards for all to see. And keep in mind that we are not a drinking club, gambling hall, or a men's only organization. And most importantly be proud of who and what we are as a community of volunteers. And a lodge that serves as a hub for fundraising, events, celebrations, and more. We are the premier benevolent organization in the United States.

Ultimately, we can control the perception of our organization and we can change those lingering negative perceptions as well. It is up to us to education and inform our communities of who we are. We can tell prospective members, friends, and guests what we do. We can also tell what our lodges do for our communities. Let them see what we do, how we do it, and why we do it. And above all remember that when you are out in your own community or at an Elks convention, when you are wearing your Elsk shirts with pride that you are our most important ambassador. And your conduct, good or bad, will reflect on us all and add to the perception of our organization. So please remember when representing our order so always conduct yourself accordingly.

Making your Elks National Foundation Grants and charity funds go further

As we head into the holidays many lodges across the country and right here in Oregon use Elks National Foundation Community Investment Grants as well as their own charity funds for a variety of projects to help those in need. Here are some tips on ways you can make your funds go further not just for your holiday projects, but year-round.

- Don't be afraid to ask for discounts. This one might seem simple, but a lot of people are uncomfortable asking for discounts. Don't be! If you explain to store manager who you are and what you're doing often they will be able to give a discount.
- 2. Do your pre-planning and look up what you intend to buy and find the best price. This is really easy with major retail stores having on-line shopping. You can comparison shop and find the best deals before you ever leave the house.
- 3. Make sure to take advantage of rewards programs like Kohl's Cash, Macy's Star Rewards, and others. These programs often can allow lodges to almost double their impact. For example, Salem Lodge received over \$2,000 in rewards credits to use with their annual Christmas Shopping program. This allowed the lodge to almost double it's ENF grant.
- 4. Ask members who have consumer credit cards at retailers if they are able to use them to get additional discounts. A lot of stores offer card holders discounts or additional discounts. You can always reimburse them with the receipt. But make sure to take advantage of any discount you can!! You can often also combine credit discounts with rewards programs for even more savings.

Salem Lodge was already mentioned above, but in 1 year across of all of their grants between discounts provided, rewards taken advantage of, and smart shopping their lodge grant team stretched \$19,000 in Elks National Foundation Grants to almost \$28,000 worth of goods provided for their various projects.

Betty Hise for Cancer Research Directors and Advisors met during Fall Seminar, in Baker City, for our winter business meeting. One year ago, due to covid reality and fewer activities, the decision was made for the 2021 Directors to stay in place a second year. After two years in the lead role of 4th year Directors, a big thank you to Diane Deseve and Jan Lowe for your extended leadership! Under their direction, our 2022 designated donation recipients (OHSU and SLCI) will each receive \$20,000 to be used for cancer research.

OHSU and SLCI keep us apprised of their current programs, presenting us with a choice of research opportunities at decision time. Appreciated, is the ability to designate our funds in a specific direction.

OHSU (Oregon Health and Science University): For the past 2 years we have supported their lymphedema prevention program and are shifting our funds to an Ovarian Cancer and Brain Metastasis Research focus. We will share more as we learn more!

Idaho SLCI (St Luke's Cancer Institute): For the past 2 years we have supported their stem cell program. Our new focus with be a study that replaces chemotherapy with immunotherapy along with monitoring patient's quality of life. More on this important study to come!

Along with advancing our current 4th year Directors to the important Advisors role, we welcomed our new 1st year Directors, Virginia Privatsky-Williams from McMinnville Lodge #1283 and Cassandra Flatt from Condon Lodge #1869 and look forward to working with them.

Fundraising fun, in Baker City, brought in just over \$2700 in raffle and auctioned items, donations and table sales! Thank you to all Lodges and individuals for items contributed and donations made.
